This early work by William Hope Hodgson was originally published in 1918 and we are now republishing it with a brand new introductory biography. Captain Gault; Being the Exceedingly Private Log of a Sea-Captain is a collection of short stories, including My Ladys Jewels, Contraband of War, The German Spy, and many more. William Hope Hodgson was born on 15th November 1877, in Blackmore End, Essex, England. Hodgson's first published short story was The Goddess of Death published in 1904. In 1907 he produced his first full-length novel The Boats of Glen Carrig. He wrote many tales inspired by his time at sea, such as the Sargasso Sea Stories, which included titles such as From the Tideless Sea (1907) and The Finding of the Graiken (1913). He received much critical success for his short stories and novels but remained relatively poor. He is now widely remembered for The House on the Borderland (1908) and The Night Land (1912), both of which contain elements of science fiction. Upon the outbreak of World War I, Hodgson became a Lieutenant in the Royal Artillery. He received a mandatory discharge...
